## Gun Lake Tribe and Gun Lake Casino donate to American Indian Center

(Wayland, Mich.) – Today, Gun Lake Casino and the Match-E-Be-Nash-She-Wish Band of Pottawatomi Indians (Gun Lake Tribe), announced it has collected monetary donations of over \$11,000, along with hundreds of physical goods which will be delivered to the <u>American Indian Center in Chicago</u>. The center provides resources to advance the general welfare of the Native American community in the Chicago area.

"The number of items donated were overwhelming," said the casino's CEO, Salvatore Semola. "We want to thank the community, and the Tribe, for their help in making a positive impact for the American Indian Center to improve the quality of life for American Indians in the city of Chicago who may not have the support of a tribal government in times of need."

Two trucks carrying over 20 pallets worth of donations departed Gun Lake Casino Thursday morning (Dec. 15) to make the journey to Chicago with the help of Gun Lake Tribal Elders.

"Gun Lake Tribe is blessed to have the ability to share what we with our relatives both near and far," said Gun Lake Tribe Chairman Bob Peters. "We're proud to provide these donations to the American Indian Center, especially at this time of year when giving is at the core of the season."

Donations were collected throughout the month of November, and casino guests were encouraged to bring in non-perishable goods as well as contribute funds to the casino floor's donation boxes. In addition, the casino made a \$5,000 donation in new goods including warm weather gear, holiday gifts for all ages, and laptop computers for the center's after school programs.

"The American Indian Center is beyond humbled and grateful for the generosity of Gun Lake and its partners in organizing this event," said Melodi Serna, the center's executive director. "As an urban Native community, we are delighted to begin a lasting relationship with our Pottawatomi relatives."
